
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A selection of details from the stock of over one hundred Art Deco buildings in the Durban area.

# IN DURBAN

ANIMALS IN THE ARCHITECTURE There was a fascination with African fauna and this stimulated the appearance of a unique range of animal forms that cropped up as stucco enrichment to the deco geometry on many buildings.

ORIENTAL OPULENCE Then there was the cultural infusion introduced by the rapid development of the Dr Yusuf Dadoo Street precinct, an area geographically settled by people of Indian descent. This has enabled the definition of Durban Deco to include the vital addition of voluptuous forms and eclectic detailing that resulted. Traces of Egyptian, Classical, Hindu, Islamic and Imperial motifs mingle happily on spandrels and balustrades, and sunburst patterns illuminate from above.

LANDMARKS AND OBSCURITIES The expression of Art Deco buildings in Durban differs from area to area. For ease of categorisation we have divided the city into three distinct precincts, namely the Central area, the Berea area and the Dr Yusuf Dadoo Street area.

ART DECO AND ALL THAT JAZZ The Art Deco movement that spread throughout the world between 1925 and 1940 embraced all the plastic and graphic arts. When Art Deco came to Durban, it placed its unique stamp on the character of the city, adding a decorative flourish to a previously staid colonial town. It was the sophisticated demonstration of new wealth, non-conformity, fast living and jazz music. Proponents, here as elsewhere, tended to be both anti-establishment and anti-intellectual; the former in resentment of the snobbery and class consciousness of the colonial mindset and the latter in reaction to the pretentiousness that was a perceived characteristic of the Modern Movement.

Durban, a sub-tropical city on the south-east coast of Africa, responded with a robust tradition of construction that favours strong, straightforward materials like concrete, brick and plaster, all admirably suited to the demands of the Art Deco movement.

CONSTRUCTS OF THE IMAGINATION Stylistically. Art Deco was manifested in strong geometric shapes and novel combinations of form and colour. It used decorative motifs shamelessly, drawing on whatever source seemed topical at the time.

Durban's architectural response to the Art Deco movement was rich with idiosyncrasies and touches characteristic of the region. These were eloquently demonstrated in details and adornments.


















